The ethics, discipline, and commissioning oath of officers are beyond dispute. The question of faith, however, persists. As a Christian, I experience no discomfort upon entering a Hindu temple; indeed, it demonstrates the strength of one's convictions, as the temple's environment exerts no influence. Compulsion to participate in its rituals, by contrast, raises a separate concern. There is no justification for offence to be taken when an individual steadfastly upholds their own faith.

The Old Testament account of Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego in the fiery furnace comes to mind. How might this narrative be reconciled with the ordeal faced by the young ex-officer?

Partitioning the Army along communal lines would prove catastrophic. Secular units, incorporating a shared prayer space, as described in the article, alongside provision for community-specific worship, represent a viable approach.

Officers should retain the discretion to participate voluntarily in other communities' observances, rather than having such practices imposed.
